Wally the famous wandering Arctic walrus has been causing Question 1 near the Isles of Scilly where he reappeared this weekend. The adventurous animal is thought to have drifted from the Arctic on an Question 2 and first hit the headlines when he was spotted around islands north of Scotland.

And after a trip to Ireland, Spain, France and Greenland, he showed his tusks again in the Isles of Scilly when he arrived on Thursday.

But while many tourists and locals have been delighted to spot the walrus, some boat owners have been left Question 3 after the large Question 4 mammal punctured dinghies that he mistook for resting spots. Photos show the walrus Question 5 on top of the rubber inflatables while forlorn owners look on helplessly.

Will Wagstaff, a freelance tour guide in the area, confirmed Wally had popped Question 6 dinghies which were attached to the backs of yachts.

Will told the Telegraph newspaper: "People were leaving their dinghies out the back of their boats and of course that is ideal for Wally to think that he can climb Question 7 for a rest, but he is way too heavy."

"And of course Wally is using his big tusks to Question 8 himself up. Soft rubber and hard Question 9 is not a good combination really."

Exports administrator, Rachel Box, 42, was delighted to spot the creature who she said looked like he needed a rest. She said: "I couldn't believe it. He was Question 10 massive. I remember turning to my boyfriend when I saw something large in the water coming towards us and thinking, is that a Question 11 seal?"

"But as he was moving closer towards us I shouted "Ooh, that's Wally the Walrus!"

"He was absolutely huge - just like an elephant! Even his skin seemed the same as an elephant. He was really Question 12 and not aggressive in the slightest."

Others were a bit weary of him piercing the rubber dinghies as he was poking about with his tusks. "He was trying to **Question 1** himself up on the boats, I think in order to get some rest." said local cafe owner, Cathy Gibson.

"Some are saying he had probably travelled 450 miles to get there so no wonder he was a little tired. He eventually **Question 2** himself on some rocks. I'm just amazed that we managed to see him."

Meanwhile, **Question 3** footage shows the juvenile male trying to climb aboard a tourist boat near the Bay of Porthcressa.

Boatsman Rafe Ward, 33, recorded his **Question 4** encounter with the friendly walrus. The creature got up close with his yacht - called the Calypso - while excited tourists **Question 5** at the spectacle. Scilly-born Rafe, who is the owner of Calypso Boating, said he had heard that Wally was in the area and had diverted from his usual two-island tour to try and get a **Question 6**.

Rafe said: "I wasn't sure if we would see him, but we spotted him straight away. I tried to keep my distance but he clearly took a **Question 7** to the boat - and it's a nice boat so I don't blame him!"

"It was great seeing him in the **Question 8** because there have been reports of sightings of Wally all over the bay recently.

"My main **Question 9** was keeping everyone on **Question 10** safe, and we'd never have got anywhere near Wally if it was dangerous - he just wanted to say hello!"

"Everyone on board absolutely **Question 11** it - one passenger said it was even more exciting than a **Question 12** trip at the Great Barrier Reef in Australia!"

Wally the walrus had travelled 518 miles north from Spain to next appear in the Bay of Porthcressa, on the island of St. Mary's, on 17th June.

Residents **Question 1** down to the beach to catch a glimpse of the tugboat-dodging animal, who was seen trying to climb aboard yachts 35 miles off the Cornish coast.

And no wonder the walrus needed to rest his flippers, after the Arctic mammal brought delight to communities in Ireland, Pembrokeshire, Cornwall and France over the past few months in his 2,000 mile **Question 2** from Greenland.

A Scilly islander said the walrus was enjoying himself around **Question 3** boats on Thursday. Local fisherman, Will Lethbridge said: "He seems **Question 4** happy and healthy. The beach is **Question 5** with people with binoculars and telescopes and it seems Wally the walrus is basking around the shoreline playing with some of the yachts."

Wally was last spotted **Question 6** up the sunshine just off the coast of Spain less than a fortnight ago as he continued his long-distance swim across Europe.

The Arctic walrus travelled 230 miles through the Bay of Biscay to the River Nervión earlier this month.

Wally spotters in France, where he was seen previously, said: "The walrus that appeared in La Rochelle last week is already in the Basque Country."

"The Bilbao tugboats **Question 7** him swimming in the mouth of the Nervion in **Question 8** good health."

Wally became a local **Question 9** when he rocked up on the south Wales coast in Tenby this year.

He was first spotted in County Kerry, Ireland, in March, before heading over to Britain after he was **Question 10** to have fallen asleep on a **Question 11** iceberg in his Arctic homeland.

Six days after first appearing in Ireland in March, the RSPCA were called out to check on the **Question 12** which was underweight, at the bottom of a cliff near Broad Haven South beach in Pembrokeshire, Wales.

Wally posed a Question 1 problem for worried lifeboat chiefs in Tenby when their emergency crews were blocked by the giant mammal on their slipway.

But after becoming a familiar sight in the area, animal Question 2 groups believe he left after becoming 'obviously disturbed' by day-trippers getting too close.

Irresponsible tourists attempted to Question 3 him using jet-skis, paddleboards and drones as he rested on a RNLI slipway in the town's harbour.

It became a concern for RNLI volunteers, who had to Question 4 to shooing Wally off the slipway, using brooms and airhorns to try to move the huge animal.

The RSPCA Cymru and Dyfed-Powys Police had to issue a Question 5 to tourists to keep their distance from Wally, who is protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

Having spent months basking in the Welsh sunshine, he then travelled further south, Question 6 up in Cornwall for a few days.

Subsequently, Wally Question 7 further south still, to Les Sables d'Olonne in western France, making it the town's first Question 8 of a walrus in 50 years.

People in Tenby are hopeful that Wally will return to Wales after his time in France, because he has become somewhat of a local celebrity, with many shops doing a roaring trade in Wally the Walrus Question 9.

RSPCA animal rescue officer Ellie West described Wally's Question 10 as 'sad' during Radio 4's Today programme back in March 2021.

She said at the time: "Whilst seeing Wally is a very Question 11 experience, it is also quite sad because we have to remember that this poor walrus is a very, very long way from where he should be; he is an Question 12 long way from home."
